1                   **MR. MUELLER:**           All right. I  
2 think we are about ready. I would like to call  
3 this meeting to order.

4            Could we have a -- you are going to be our  
5 clerk pro tem?

6                   **MS. PALMER:**           No.

7                   **MR. GABRAM:**           No.

8                   **MS. PALMER:**           We have -- we have  
9 the clerk.

10                   **MR. MUELLER:**           Okay. All right.  
11 Okay. Roll call, please.

12                   **MS. WALDER:**           Ms. Port?

13                   **MS. PORT:**           Here.

14                   **MS. WALDER:**           Mr. Gabram?

15                   **MR. GABRAM:**           Yes.

16                   **MS. WALDER:**           Mr. Mueller?

17                   **MR. MUELLER:**           Here.

18            The first item of business is the Fire  
19 Department pumper contract. This is part of the  
20 Department of Administrative Services, state-  
21 wide bid contract, I guess is what you would  
22 say. They go out for bids and they get those.

23            And I guess I would like to have a motion to  
24 approve the purchase agreement with Finley Fire  
25 Equipment Company in McConnelsville, Ohio, dated

1 January 24, 2020, for a Quantum Pumper, per Ohio  
2 Department of Administrative Services Schedule  
3 Number 800721, pending approval as to form by the  
4 Prosecutor's Office.

5 **MS. PORT:** I will so move.

6 **MR. GABRAM:** I will second  
7 that.

8 **MR. MUELLER:** All of those in  
9 favor? Aye.

10 **MR. GABRAM:** Aye.

11 **MS. PORT:** Aye.

12 **MR. MUELLER:** Aye. Okay.

13 **MR. SHANKER:** How much was the  
14 low --

15 **MS. WALDER:** Should --

16 **MR. SHANKER:** How much was the  
17 low bid? How much did they approve it for?

18 **MR. MUELLER:** State-wide bid, it  
19 is like \$661,000.

20 **MR. SHANKER:** Plus, what? One  
21 hundred and fifty to put everything back in it?

22 **MR. MUELLER:** No, no, not  
23 really.

24 **MR. SHANKER:** That includes  
25 the -- all of the equipment?

1                   **MR. MUELLER:**           Yes, most of  
2 the -- yeah.

3                   **MR. GABRAM:**           Jim?

4                   **MR. MUELLER:**           Yes.

5                   **MR. GABRAM:**           Why don't we back  
6 up a little bit? We have got a second motion.  
7 But probably with that second, we need -- we  
8 should discuss before we take a vote.

9                   **MR. MUELLER:**           Okay. All right.  
10 The second motion that we have is to authorize  
11 me, James Mueller -- Jim Mueller, to act as the  
12 Township contract representative and signatory  
13 for the purchase and all associated financial  
14 documents for the Fire Department Pumper,  
15 purchase date of January 24, 2020, pending  
16 approval as to form by the Prosecutor's Office.

17                   Okay. Discussion?

18                   **MS. PORT:**           Well, don't we  
19 have to -- we have to -- we have to say "aye" on  
20 the motion and --

21                   **MR. GABRAM:**           Well --

22                   **MS. PORT:**           -- and so move and  
23 second, and then we discuss.

24                   **MR. GABRAM:**           And then we  
25 discuss it, right.

1                   **MS. PORT:**                   Right. Exactly.

2                   **MS. WALDER:**                   Do we have a  
3 discussion on the first one?

4                   **MR. GABRAM:**                   On the first  
5 one -- there should be a discussion on the first  
6 motion.

7                   **MR. SHANKER:**                   Right.

8                   **MR. MUELLER:**                   All right.

9                   **MR. GABRAM:**                   Okay.

10                  **MR. MUELLER:**                   All right. All  
11 right. Let's discuss that.

12                  **MR. GABRAM:**                   All right. Here  
13 is John.

14                  **MR. MUELLER:**                   John.

15                  **MR. GABRAM:**                   You are about two  
16 minutes late, so --

17                  **MR. SHANKER:**                   He was at a fire.

18                  **MR. GABRAM:**                   -- we made a  
19 motion and we got a second, and it is up for  
20 discussion right now.

21                  **MR. MUELLER:**                   This is for the  
22 contract -- the Fire Department Pumper contract,  
23 issue one.

24                  **MR. SHANKER:**                   I have a  
25 question.

1                   **MR. GABRAM:**           Wait a minute.

2                   **MR. SHANKER:**           Okay.

3                   **MR. GABRAM:**           Okay. There was a  
4 slight problem with the contract, I guess --

5                   **MS. WALDER:**           Yes.

6                   **MR. GABRAM:**           -- to my  
7 understanding.

8                   **MS. WALDER:**           I am frankly not  
9 sure what contract we are considering at this  
10 point.

11                   **MR. GABRAM:**           All right. All  
12 right. What -- where are we at this point, I  
13 think, is what we need to talk about.

14                   **MR. MUELLER:**          Right.

15                   **MS. PORT:**            As far as my  
16 e-mail correspondence, at least with the  
17 Assistant Prosecutor, and from Melissa's  
18 documentation and e-mails, it seems to be that  
19 there was a question about the Quantum Pumper  
20 being listed as such in that name on the State  
21 bid.

22                   **MR. FRAZIER:**          Yes, and it is.  
23 So -- and two things. Kristen asked to redo the  
24 purchase agreement, and she -- and she provided  
25 that maybe -- I don't know if you saw that --

1 maybe about two hours ago.

2 **MS. PORT:** Yeah, I have  
3 that.

4 **MR. FRAZIER:** Okay.

5 **MS. PORT:** I printed it out.

6 **MR. MUELLER:** Okay.

7 **MR. FRAZIER:** She redid the  
8 purchase agreement. So she asked that Finley put  
9 together the State bid list option, and those  
10 costs, to come up with the cost basically on how  
11 they achieve the price.

12 **MS. PORT:** So it would be  
13 like another exhibit, or attachment --

14 **MR. FRAZIER:** Yes.

15 **MS. PORT:** -- that just  
16 itemizes the prices of the parts, so to speak?

17 **MR. FRAZIER:** Yes.

18 **MS. PORT:** That is what her  
19 inquiry was, and that was itemized.

20 **MR. FRAZIER:** So that would be  
21 attached to the purchase agreement. And she  
22 redid the purchase agreement, so she addresses  
23 that in that purchase agreement.

24 **MS. PORT:** Right. And then  
25 the second was the question of the -- how did



1 they arrive at that cost, or so? But I think  
2 with the itemized list, it would help with just  
3 how that --

4 **MR. FRAZIER:** How they arrived  
5 at -- yes.

6 **MS. PORT:** Correct.

7 **MR. FRAZIER:** So when --

8 **MS. PORT:** So I think when  
9 that is supplied, which it sounds like she has  
10 already asked for that, in this contract, to  
11 be --

12 **MR. FRAZIER:** Yes.

13 **MS. PORT:** -- addressed.

14 **MR. FRAZIER:** And that would be  
15 attached to that document, as well as the option  
16 list.

17 **MS. PORT:** Right.

18 **MR. FRAZIER:** So that her -- her  
19 concern was that -- let's say there is a dispute  
20 over an option, and the option list does not  
21 provide it, then there is nothing to go back on.  
22 So if that option list becomes an exhibit, it is  
23 detailed in that 114 page --

24 **MS. PORT:** Right.

25 **MR. FRAZIER:** It is described.

1 But the option list goes into detail on what it  
2 is, where it goes. It is an extremely detailed  
3 list. So even standard options go on it; where  
4 lights are attached --

5 **MS. PORT:** Right.

6 **MR. FRAZIER:** -- right side,  
7 left side and things like that. So it is almost  
8 an instruction list for them.

9 **MR. MUELLER:** You have to  
10 remember that when they go out for bid for these  
11 things, the State or -- they do not -- there is  
12 no way that they could possibly go out for a bid  
13 that is exactly what he would want to have on the  
14 unit.

15 **MS. PORT:** Yes. It is like  
16 customizing.

17 **MR. MUELLER:** Right. So it is  
18 like you basically buy into the framework of what  
19 it is.

20 **MR. SHANKER:** Right.

21 **MR. MUELLER:** It is like, you  
22 know, we have got the Ford Fairlane 200, or  
23 whatever it is. And that is what you get. And  
24 then all the additional items -- I don't even  
25 know that they are actually on the State bid. I

1 doubt seriously that the fact that you want the  
2 raised letters, as opposed to the -- whatever  
3 else it is --

4 **MR. FRAZIER:** It is probably the  
5 bigger options. So, yeah, they actually -- every  
6 option that they provide is bid on the State Term  
7 Schedule.

8 **MR. MUELLER:** Yes.

9 **MR. FRAZIER:** So those all exist  
10 on it.

11 **MR. GABRAM:** Just the options,  
12 though? You are talking about this engine or  
13 that engine, or this pump versus that pump, that  
14 would be the State bid?

15 You are not talking about the nuts and bolts  
16 that -- the small stuff that --

17 **MR. FRAZIER:** Right. Right.

18 **MR. GABRAM:** Those are just a  
19 zillion things that --

20 **MR. MUELLER:** Like the little  
21 rabbit's foot that hangs over the rearview  
22 mirror.

23 **MR. GABRAM:** Exactly. Exactly.

24 **MR. FRAZIER:** But if you look at  
25 the options list, it is a little complicated.

1 And it is in their -- in their -- the way they  
2 lay it out for the truck.

3 But the 114 page document, then, describes  
4 what that option is.

5 **MR. GABRAM:** Okay.

6 **MS. PORT:** So it is like  
7 the -- it is like you get the document, and then  
8 this is the tutorial that -- it is like the  
9 manual to explain --

10 **MR. FRAZIER:** Yes. When I  
11 talked to Kristen, she suggested just attach that  
12 options list, because that helps reinforce the  
13 114 page document on the proposal.

14 **MS. PORT:** Okay. Right.

15 **MR. MUELLER:** Okay. We were --  
16 do you want to -- do you want to re-vote on  
17 that?

18 **MR. GABRAM:** Yes, I do.

19 **MR. MUELLER:** All right.

20 **MR. GABRAM:** At this point, we  
21 just had --

22 **MR. MUELLER:** That is okay.

23 That is fine.

24 **MR. GABRAM:** -- had the  
25 second --

1                   **MR. FRAZIER:**           Any other  
2 questions on that or --

3                   **MS. WALDER:**           Well, I have a  
4 great many, because I have not had a chance to  
5 even review this proposed document that you are  
6 voting on. And I don't know -- I don't know if  
7 the Trustees have --

8                   **MR. MUELLER:**           Did you review the  
9 previous document?

10                  **MS. WALDER:**           Yes, I did. And I  
11 discussed the issues --

12                  **MR. MUELLER:**           I can't imagine  
13 the changes are terribly big.

14                  **MS. WALDER:**           Well, it is a  
15 completely different format.

16                  **MR. MUELLER:**           But it is the one  
17 that is suggested by the County Prosecutor's  
18 Office. She is the one who drafted it.

19                  The one that you have, she had some problems  
20 with. The one that he has has been -- that we  
21 are going to vote on, she has approved.

22                  **MR. FRAZIER:**           Yeah. Well, that  
23 was shipped to Finley --

24                  **MR. MUELLER:**           Okay.

25                  **MR. FRAZIER:**           -- this

1 afternoon. So the -- so they can look at that  
2 document.

3 **MS. WALDER:** I do not have a  
4 document that she has approved as to form.

5 **MS. PALMER:** Yeah. Today's  
6 document that you sent it 2'ish, is that right, I  
7 don't believe she has approved as to form; is  
8 that right?

9 **MR. FRAZIER:** I don't think so.  
10 I don't remember seeing it.

11 **MS. PALMER:** Yeah. She sent  
12 it --

13 **MR. FRAZIER:** I remember seeing  
14 a signature line, but --

15 **MS. PALMER:** She sent it, but  
16 she did not sign it yet.

17 **MR. FRAZIER:** Yes. So when  
18 she sent that --

19 **MR. MUELLER:** But she drafted  
20 it?

21 **MS. PALMER:** And she sent it  
22 for your review.

23 **MR. MUELLER:** Okay. If she  
24 drafted it, I can't imagine she isn't going to  
25 sign it, because it is her work; is it not? That

1 is true, right?

2 **MR. GABRAM:** Yes, she drafted  
3 it.

4 **MR. MUELLER:** And the only  
5 thing -- the only thing that could prevent her  
6 signature would be if Finley writes back that,  
7 you know, "You want it in blue instead of red?"

8 **MR. FRAZIER:** Yes, if there is  
9 some term that they don't -- they don't agree  
10 to.

11 But that was -- so she sent that document;  
12 we discussed it. So I took that document, then,  
13 and shipped it to Finley for their review. And  
14 then I am waiting for that to come back.

15 And then she would get that back, if there  
16 is any -- and we have already -- we have done  
17 that with the original document. It went back  
18 and forth a couple of times, because there were  
19 some things that were taken out of it.

20 **MS. WALDER:** My understanding  
21 is the original document was drafted by Finley  
22 Fire. That was the seven page purchase  
23 agreement?

24 **MR. FRAZIER:** Yes. And then  
25 Kristen looked at that, removed some items.

1 Finley Fire agreed to it. There was an  
2 indemnification clause. There was a trial by  
3 jury clause. Those were taken out for Finley to  
4 review. They were okay with that, shipped back  
5 and then she -- the changes that she had, she  
6 signed off on that.

7 **MR. GABRAM:** But we didn't get  
8 that one back from Finley Fire yet?

9 **MR. FRAZIER:** No. The second  
10 one -- so that was redone. She -- Kristen redid  
11 that same document, the purchase agreement. And  
12 that is now in Finley's hands.

13 **MS. PORT:** So that is this  
14 document, which she drafted? And essentially  
15 this motion is just to approve the form by the --  
16 as to form, which was originated from the County  
17 Prosecutor's Office, correct?

18 **MR. MUELLER:** And if the  
19 Prosecutor has a problem with it, there is an  
20 opportunity for them to --

21 **MS. PORT:** To correct it.

22 **MR. MUELLER:** -- to correct it.

23 **MR. GABRAM:** A contingency  
24 on --

25 **MR. MUELLER:** Right. Exactly.



1                   **MR. GABRAM:**                   There would be a  
2 contingency on --

3                   **MS. PORT:**                    So essentially we  
4 are still not doing anything out of the ordinary  
5 by saying "Please look to the form," which is the  
6 form that came from the County Prosecutor's,  
7 correct?

8                   **MR. MUELLER:**                   Over the years --  
9 over the years, there have been many times  
10 when we have signed a document like this.  
11 Because, you know, sometimes you can't get the  
12 Prosecutor's Office to react that quickly, so we  
13 do it this way.

14                   **MR. GABRAM:**                   Pending approval  
15 as to the form --

16                   **MS. PORT:**                    Right. So it is  
17 still --

18                   **MR. GABRAM:**                   -- by the Geauga  
19 County Prosecutor. So, I mean, this motion --

20                   **MS. PORT:**                    This motion is --

21                   **MR. GABRAM:**                   -- could be all  
22 right.

23                   **MS. PORT:**                    Well --

24                   **MR. GABRAM:**                   We are just  
25 approving their -- the form.

1                   **MS. PORT:**                   Right.

2                   **MS. WALDER:**                   You are not  
3 approving as to form. She has to approve as to  
4 form.

5                   **MR. MUELLER:**                   Right. Exactly.

6                   **MS. WALDER:**                   You are asking to  
7 approve the document. And, again, I reiterate, I  
8 have not read it or reviewed this document.

9                   I can tell you that one of the issues I had  
10 with the original purchase agreement was that the  
11 wording of the agreement and the specifications  
12 that were attached, I found about 14 instances  
13 where it referred to potential added costs.

14                  Now, maybe I will back up a second. Because  
15 I have never done this before, you know. I am  
16 relatively -- I have never -- I have never been  
17 through this process before. But as I understand  
18 it, what our APA does is determine what the  
19 Township legally can do.

20                  My view of what the Board of Trustees'  
21 responsibility is is to determine what is the  
22 Township's best interest to do. And what I view  
23 as my responsibility is to determine what is  
24 fiscally responsible, what complies with the  
25 required ORC and Auditor of State requirements,

1 and will meet the audit requirements in the  
2 doing of it.

3 One of the requirements I have as Fiscal  
4 Officer is to apply -- is to comply with ORC  
5 5705.41, which is called "Restriction upon  
6 appropriation and expenditure of money -  
7 certificate of fiscal officer." And it goes on  
8 for several pages.

9 But the pertinent sections indicate, "In any  
10 case in which a contract is entered into upon a  
11 per unit basis, the head of the department, board  
12 or commission for the benefit of which the  
13 contract is made shall make an estimate of the  
14 total amount to become due upon such contract,  
15 which estimate shall be certified in writing to  
16 the fiscal officer of the subdivision."

17 Because of that requirement is why I sent  
18 the e-mail -- was it last week -- before your  
19 last Trustee Meeting, asking about these  
20 potential additional charges. Because if those  
21 will become part of this contract, I -- you know,  
22 we need to identify this. This is --

23 **MR. MUELLER:** I guess my point  
24 is, is that I would -- I disagree with that to  
25 some point, because what we have here is a

1 contract before us that does the following  
2 things; whatever those things are. And we do  
3 those and we have a dollar amount to that.

4 Anything that happens beyond that, if we  
5 decide we want a blue fire truck instead of a red  
6 one, that is something we have to add on to  
7 this. And that is just -- you know, that is no  
8 different than if we went to the local body shop  
9 around here and said, "We want it painted blue."

10 **MR. SHANKER:** Well, shouldn't  
11 it --

12 **MR. MUELLER:** It doesn't -- it  
13 doesn't have to be comprehensibly in the very  
14 vehicle. What we are trying to do is we are  
15 trying to sign through that the -- that the  
16 Quantum Pumper, as provided to us by the  
17 Department of Administrative Services, which  
18 in no way can possibly delineate every single  
19 little thing that, you know, is going to be in  
20 there.

21 **MR. GABRAM:** And,  
22 traditionally, I have gone through four or five  
23 of these trucks. Traditionally, there are  
24 changes as it is being built.

25 **MR. FRAZIER:** Well, what --

1                   **MR. GABRAM:**               Some to the good  
2                   and some for the bad.

3                   **MR. FRAZIER:**               Kristen discussed  
4                   that. And to address your concern; in that, the  
5                   amended purchase agreement, there is a clause in  
6                   there that she added that if there is anything  
7                   that exceeds their proposal price, it has to be  
8                   negotiated between both the Township and the  
9                   manufacturer then. So anything above that amount  
10                  would have to be negotiated.

11                  **MS. WALDER:**               Right.

12                  **MR. FRAZIER:**               So it isn't an  
13                  automatic charge or --

14                  **MS. WALDER:**               Yes. Right. And  
15                  that was one of the particular items in the  
16                  purchase agreement.

17                  The other items, though, that I had  
18                  questions on refer to the overall cost that the  
19                  Township will have to -- you know, will have to  
20                  commit to to have this vehicle.

21                  And that is why I was asking about added  
22                  costs for software and firmware updates, or the  
23                  additional equipment that is referenced. That --  
24                  those specifications reference equipment that  
25                  Russell Township is to provide.

1 I don't have information --

2 **MR. FRAZIER:** No, it doesn't --  
3 it doesn't -- actually, that part of it doesn't  
4 require -- on the software, doesn't specifically  
5 say that we are required to provide any software  
6 or upgrade any software.

7 We have that present system in our current  
8 engine. The 2005 has the Command Zone Version I.  
9 This they are advocating Command -- Command Zone  
10 Version III, so it is the most updated version.  
11 So we already deal with that system.

12 Much -- if you take your car to the mechanic  
13 and they -- there are codes that are -- the  
14 little wrench comes on -- light comes on --

15 **MS. WALDER:** Right.

16 **MR. FRAZIER:** They plug in, and  
17 then they can read those codes. We have that in  
18 our current engine, our current Quantum. And  
19 then the new one would have the latest version.

20 The latest version is tied into the  
21 internet, so they can actually do it from  
22 Wisconsin, or they can do it from -- they have a  
23 repair facility in Lake County. So they don't  
24 have to come and plug into it. They can read it  
25 off the internet.

1           So it -- it has evolved that much, but it is  
2 exactly the same system. So we have spent zero  
3 on that. And, actually, Countryside Truck has  
4 dealt with enough of those, that he has purchased  
5 the software, or acquired the software. I am not  
6 sure exactly how he -- you know, if he had to pay  
7 for that or not. So he can read our codes, too.

8           So we have the ability to read that  
9 either through the manufacturer or through our  
10 mechanic. So sometimes he comes down and he can  
11 do that, or Finley Fire will send somebody down  
12 to read the codes. And they -- the newest  
13 system, they call it MUX, so that is the wireless  
14 system that they can read those codes.

15           The second part of that was a vehicle  
16 recorder that you asked about. That is actually  
17 part of that Command Zone system. So that is in  
18 case of an event; so an event would be rapid  
19 deceleration, rapid acceleration or a crash. So  
20 if the sensors went off, and that occurred --

21                   **MR. MUELLER:**           It is like a black  
22 box?

23                   **MR. FRAZIER:**           Yes, it is. In  
24 talking with police reconstructionists, that deal  
25 on the vehicles, all cars have had that since

1 2009. So this would have that same system.

2 We don't have to store that data or do  
3 anything with it, because it is looped. So it is  
4 constantly reading that. An event occurs, so  
5 somebody smashes -- say somebody smashes into it  
6 and sets off the sensors, that vehicle -- the  
7 vehicle recorder backs up approximately five  
8 seconds. And then that is available for download  
9 to -- for the police -- usually the police obtain  
10 that in a search warrant or administrative  
11 warrant, and can use that data, then, to figure  
12 out what happened with the crash.

13 But that would be part of that same system.  
14 And we wouldn't have really anything to do with  
15 that part of it. You know, that would be the  
16 insurance company, police, you know, depending on  
17 the accident. So we would not download any of  
18 that information. But that would be specific to  
19 those two systems.

20 And the selection of our vehicles, based on  
21 the success we had with the current unit, that  
22 that system works extremely well and we're able  
23 to troubleshoot, so it would have the -- a very  
24 similar system, the Command Zone, and that would  
25 be an updated system. So it would be Version



1 III.

2 But we have spent -- we have had that  
3 vehicle for 16 years. We have spent zero dollars  
4 on any software upgrades, cabling --

5 **MS. WALDER:** Well, and that is  
6 the gist of my question. I am looking for some  
7 information back from you. Because when I see  
8 things like, you know, Information Center with a  
9 Linux Operating System; I see Onboard Electrical  
10 System Diagnostics; I see Tech Module with WiFi;  
11 I see Advanced Diagnostics; a Windows Base  
12 System.

13 I mean, you know, if we are looking at a ten  
14 year financing, you know, that is a long time in  
15 terms of technology. My question was: Is there  
16 either an annual subscription service? Is there  
17 an upgrade? How long are upgrades included with  
18 the -- you know, with the vehicle? Or are there  
19 upgrades that at some point we would need to  
20 purchase?

21 **MR. MUELLER:** We are buying  
22 the vehicle as a basic package. We cannot be  
23 guaranteed that in three years, or five years,  
24 they are not going to come along and say, "You  
25 know, we have this really new, very enhanced

1 thing." We may purchase it.

2 **MR. FRAZIER:** You know, with our  
3 experience with the current engine, we have -- we  
4 have not spent any on any upgrades.

5 As a matter of fact, we have never read the  
6 codes on that. So that has always been either  
7 the manufacturer, the dealership or our mechanic  
8 that has -- third-party mechanic that has read  
9 those codes.

10 So we have never even downloaded that  
11 information and looked at it. And we have spent  
12 zero in that vehicle, and it is 16 years old now.  
13 Zero on any software, firmware updates. We  
14 haven't done anything with that for the --  
15 related to that.

16 So I think, you know, that is more with the  
17 dealership on -- if they upgrade it. If they  
18 want to read the codes and want to fix it, you  
19 know, they are going to have to have the  
20 equipment to do that. And we have not spent  
21 anything on that to this point.

22 **MS. WALDER:** Okay. So you  
23 should be able to get me some information back,  
24 that there is --

25 **MR. MUELLER:** I want to proceed

1 with this.

2 **MS. WALDER:** The other --  
3 excuse me.

4 **MR. MUELLER:** And the other  
5 thing is that, you know, John tells me that if we  
6 don't do it by the 1st of the month, there is an  
7 \$18,000 increase, 3 percent.

8 **MR. GABRAM:** Three percent,  
9 yes.

10 **MR. MUELLER:** And that -- I  
11 don't want to see us let that money just slide  
12 away.

13 **MS. WALDER:** Well, with all due  
14 respect, though, the ORC's are not written and  
15 say, "Oh, but if it is inconvenient, or if it is  
16 expedient or if it saves -- you know, if it gets  
17 us around the price increase, you don't have to  
18 worry about it."

19 And certainly I don't think the Board is  
20 proposing that we not follow Ohio Revised Code in  
21 favor of expedience.

22 **MR. MUELLER:** But that is what  
23 the Prosecutor's Office is going to make sure we  
24 are going to do.

25 **MS. WALDER:** Well, we --

1                   **MR. MUELLER:**           So I would like to  
2 move forward on this.

3                   **MR. GABRAM:**           What -- looking at  
4 Bainbridge, the different contracts they have --  
5 it all goes through the same system here, as far  
6 as the Prosecuting Attorney okaying their  
7 contracts, and so forth. Are they different? I  
8 mean, they deal with Finley Fire. Their front  
9 line is basically Pierce.

10                  **MR. FRAZIER:**           I believe they  
11 ordered E-ONE's.

12                  **MR. GABRAM:**           E-ONE's?

13                  **MR. FRAZIER:**           I think they  
14 ordered two units, yeah.

15                  **MR. GABRAM:**           Okay. Is it  
16 any different than the -- do you have any idea  
17 how --

18                  **MR. FRAZIER:**           No, I don't, not  
19 specifically. I know they looked at Pierce.  
20 They looked at E-ONE. They looked at a couple of  
21 manufacturers.

22                  **MS. PORT:**           May I ask a  
23 question about how much? Since this is a big  
24 ticket item, this was budgeted for 2019, for the  
25 Pumper? So it was in a budget?

1                   **MR. FRAZIER:**           Actually, what  
2 we did with -- we had originally budgeted 80,000  
3 as a prepayment on the vehicle. So that was  
4 budgeted. And then after that, in the ten year  
5 plan, or five year plan -- five to ten year plan,  
6 we had then budgeted an amount for the annual  
7 payments, which were within about \$2,400  
8 currently.

9                   **MS. PORT:**               Okay. So within  
10 your projections?

11                   **MR. FRAZIER:**           Yeah.

12                   **MS. WALDER:**           It was not  
13 budgeted for 2019. It was budgeted for 2020.

14                   **MR. FRAZIER:**           2020. We -- we  
15 had proposed an \$80,000 prepayment. So that --  
16 that is sitting in the budget right now.

17                   **MS. PORT:**               Okay.

18                   **MS. WALDER:**           The other items  
19 that are referenced that I am concerned about,  
20 additional costs, relate to the items that  
21 specify that will be supplied by Russell  
22 Township. And there is a number of items where  
23 it identifies that.

24                   And the reason I am asking all of these  
25 questions is because of these requirements of

1 the ORC 5705.41. And the other -- the other  
2 part of this, which I think the Board of  
3 Trustees should be aware of, is that it states,  
4 "No sub -- no subdivision or taxing unit shall:  
5 Make any contract or give any order involving the  
6 expenditure of money, unless there is attached  
7 thereto a certificate of the fiscal officer of  
8 the subdivision that the amount required -- of  
9 the amount required to meet the obligation."

10 So that is why I am asking the question:  
11 What is the whole total amount we are going to  
12 need to meet the obligation? It is not just  
13 the cost of the truck. It is the cost of the  
14 financing. It is the cost of the loan  
15 origination. And it is the cost of any of these  
16 additional materials -- items that by con -- that  
17 are being included in the contract that we have  
18 to provide.

19 I do not have that information. And at  
20 this point, I would not be able to certify any  
21 contract that -- that you would make at this  
22 point.

23 **MR. FRAZIER:** Well, the  
24 issues -- the National Fire Protection  
25 Association, before that vehicle leaves the

1 building, has to have certain equipment that  
2 will be on that vehicle.

3 So you can buy it from the manufacturer,  
4 but we already have a vehicle, so that  
5 equipment -- three ladders will be transferred  
6 over; pike poles; air packs; all of that  
7 equipment that is mentioned in the loose list  
8 comes over into the new vehicle.

9 So -- and those items are -- in the option  
10 list are specifically listed as not included in  
11 the contract, or not required.

12 **MR. MUELLER:** What you are  
13 asking us to do is to figure out exactly what  
14 this thing is going to cost us over a ten year  
15 period of time. And that, lady, is impossible.

16 **MS. WALDER:** Well --

17 **MR. MUELLER:** It is impossible.

18 **MS. WALDER:** -- I don't know  
19 if it is impossible. That is what the ORC  
20 requires. And that is --

21 **MR. MUELLER:** I don't know how  
22 we ever did this before; it is amazing to me,  
23 you know, that we were able to do these  
24 lease-purchase things in the past and there was  
25 never a problem.

1                   **MR. FRAZIER:**           Well, other than  
2     our Capital Equipment Schedule, which addresses  
3     the equipment that is carried on the Pumpers,  
4     there -- there are no additional costs to those  
5     items. So we don't have to buy a ladder. We  
6     don't have to buy an axe. We don't have to buy  
7     an air pack. We don't have to buy a radio.

8           All of those things come out of our current  
9     engine, including the mobile radios, the Mark  
10    System. All of that comes out and is installed  
11    and placed in the new apparatus.

12                   **MS. WALDER:**           Okay. Well -- and  
13    that is fine. I am just saying, if there is no  
14    additional costs, you need to tell me "There is  
15    no additional costs for these items. The cost  
16    for the financing is going to be this much. The  
17    cost of the loan origination could be this much.  
18    The cost of any, you know -- any equipment that  
19    is specified here that we don't already have will  
20    be X." That is --

21                   **MR. FRAZIER:**           No. That is --

22                   **MS. WALDER:**           That is what I  
23    need.

24                   **MR. FRAZIER:**           And that is a  
25    reasonable question. You know, everything that



1 the lessor, NFP, requires -- we have an NFP  
2 compliant Pumper, so -- now, with the equipment,  
3 so that equipment would just move off of that rig  
4 and onto the new piece of equipment. So we don't  
5 have to buy new ladders, new air packs, new  
6 radios.

7 And that is how we have always done it.  
8 Actually, the tanker was the same way. That  
9 didn't come with anything on it. All of the old  
10 stuff came off and then went onto the new -- the  
11 new tanker.

12 Now, is there a bracket or a bolt or a nut?  
13 There could be. You know, sometimes when we  
14 do -- we have to mount something, there might be  
15 screws or things related to that, but it would  
16 be --

17 **MR. MUELLER:** The actual  
18 purchase --

19 **MR. FRAZIER:** -- it would be  
20 minimal.

21 **MR. MUELLER:** The actual  
22 purchase -- the purchase of the core piece of  
23 equipment is set and it is specific, and it  
24 includes certain things. And then after that,  
25 who knows.

1                   **MS. WALDER:**                   Oh, I understand.

2                   **MR. MUELLER:**                   That is right. It  
3 is like -- it is like me asking you -- you just  
4 bought a new Fairlane. "How much money are you  
5 going to spend on it in the next ten years?" You  
6 have no idea what is going to happen in six  
7 years.

8                   **MS. WALDER:**                   Oh, no, I am  
9 not talking about -- oh, no. I am talking  
10 about items that are included in this proposed  
11 contract.

12                   **MR. GABRAM:**                   They are all  
13 listed.

14                   **MS. PORT:**                   They are all  
15 listed.

16                   **MR. GABRAM:**                   Everything is  
17 listed, so that is --

18                   **MS. PORT:**                   As far as I know,  
19 from the options.

20                   **MS. WALDER:**                   Right.

21                   **MS. PORT:**                   I don't want to --

22                   **MR. MUELLER:**                   I don't want to --  
23 I don't want to get us in a position of Columbo.

24                   **MR. GABRAM:**                   Yeah, between a  
25 rock and a hard place.

1                   **MR. MUELLER:**           Just one more  
2 thing.

3                   **MS. WALDER:**           No, I think it  
4 is --

5                   **MR. MUELLER:**           No, I am serious.

6                   **MS. WALDER:**           I think it's -- I  
7 think the ORC, and I am just -- and this is just  
8 my opinion, you know, is in the spirit of  
9 transparency that -- you know, if there is -- if  
10 there is an agreement to pay, you know, \$662,000,  
11 but if in there it says that Russell Township has  
12 to provide, you know, \$50,000 more worth of  
13 equipment, then -- you know, we need to know  
14 that, because that is specified in the contract.

15                   And, again, I -- I need to certify -- I need  
16 to understand what the total commitment this  
17 contract, you know, is obligating. And I need to  
18 certify that. And I can tell you, I don't have  
19 that. I don't have that at this point.

20                   **MS. PORT:**           But it sounds  
21 like the Prosecutor's Office pretty much -- aside  
22 from -- I mean, she has already suggested the  
23 additional attachment to the agreement, which is  
24 forthcoming.

25                   And to me, it is like we have already done

1 the due diligence with the Prosecutor's Office,  
2 have the specs down, the option list, the  
3 different attachments that are necessary. And  
4 the only thing we are waiting for is Finley to  
5 just come back and say, "Okay," correct?

6 **MR. FRAZIER:** Yes.

7 **MS. WALDER:** Well --

8 **MS. PORT:** So with that --

9 **MS. WALDER:** -- with all due  
10 respect, the fiscal officer needs the opportunity  
11 to review -- to review any contract, to find out  
12 if it meets the ability of Russell Township to  
13 fulfill.

14 Again, going back to the, you know --

15 **MR. MUELLER:** You are going to  
16 cost us -- if you want to do all of this, you are  
17 going to cost us \$18,000.

18 **MS. WALDER:** Well, Mr. Mueller,  
19 I --

20 **MR. MUELLER:** I mean, I have  
21 been through this a couple of times in my career  
22 here. And Gary has been. I don't ever remember  
23 having to, you know, slog through this.

24 **MS. WALDER:** Well, like I said,  
25 the ORC doesn't care if it is inconvenient. And,

1 again, I resent any implication or any pressure  
2 that I should somehow, you know, not do my  
3 responsibility as fiscal officer and, you know,  
4 not follow the ORC just because of expedience.

5 If you recall, we have had multiple  
6 discussions on the reason that I suggested that  
7 we need 60 days to review and vet these  
8 agreements. We talked about that back in June,  
9 at the Budget Commission, that we -- and that was  
10 one of the lessons learned from buying the last  
11 large piece of equipment.

12 And everybody agreed that, yes, start early;  
13 we need more time to review that. We reiterated  
14 that, and we talked about that in November. I  
15 said --

16 **MR. MUELLER:** So 60 days does  
17 seem exorbitantly long.

18 **MS. WALDER:** Well, at that  
19 time, nobody -- nobody -- and to be honest with  
20 you, and with all due respect, Mr. Mueller, you  
21 are not the one performing that review and  
22 vetting operation.

23 We talked about the 60 days. We talked  
24 about it in November with the Chief and Chairman  
25 Madden, that if you are looking at a purchase in

1 the first quarter, you better get the information  
2 and the data over to us by November 1st. Do you  
3 recall that, Chief?

4 **MR. FRAZIER:** We did have that  
5 discussion. And, unfortunately, there were some  
6 events that pushed that further. We had the  
7 original contract to the Prosecutor's Office by  
8 November 4th. So we were doing our best to try  
9 and get that accomplished.

10 **MS. WALDER:** Well, you know,  
11 even as recent as two weeks ago, you know, you  
12 provided me some information with a Master Lease  
13 Agreement with PNC Equipment Finance, which I,  
14 you know, reviewed.

15 And I was a bit surprised when yesterday I  
16 found a Huntington Bank term sheet come through.  
17 I -- I don't know how we went from PNC to  
18 Huntington. But, again --

19 **MS. PORT:** Well, that was at  
20 the last Trustee Meeting that we had discussed,  
21 and John had found out that --

22 **MR. MUELLER:** It is going to  
23 save us some money, too.

24 **MS. PORT:** -- that was going  
25 to save us money to go with Huntington.

1                   **MR. MUELLER:**           It is cheaper. It  
2 is cheaper.

3                   **MS. WALDER:**           Yeah. Well, if  
4 you recall, when we sat in my office --

5                   **MR. GABRAM:**           We sat down and we  
6 talked about that.

7                   **MS. WALDER:**           Right. I said  
8 whatever the rationale, whatever evaluation  
9 comparison that you did for looking at financing  
10 sources, could you please memorialize that for  
11 me. Because, again, when this comes up for an  
12 audit in two years, I am going to be asked what  
13 was the rationale for this decision for, you  
14 know, what was looked at, and what was the  
15 rationale for making that.

16                   So like I said, I found out yesterday that  
17 we weren't using -- planning to use PNC; you  
18 know, we are using Huntington. I have not seen  
19 that Lease Purchase Agreement document at all.  
20 And -- and so, again --

21                   **MR. GABRAM:**           I think the last  
22 four engines or rigs, that we used -- we did use  
23 Huntington.

24                   But you came up at that meeting and said,  
25 "What other banks have you looked at?" And so

1 when we left, we -- we checked other banks.

2 **MR. FRAZIER:** I drove to  
3 Middlefield. I drove to Huntington. And I drove  
4 to Chase and discussed that with them. And then  
5 we requested pricing from them.

6 **MR. GABRAM:** Yeah. It was like  
7 a \$20,000 over a ten year period that we would be  
8 saving with Huntington over PNC.

9 **MR. FRAZIER:** Through  
10 Huntington, I discovered that Twinsburg was  
11 financing through them and talked to them. And  
12 they were very happy with Huntington. And we had  
13 financed four of our previous vehicles through  
14 Huntington, so that was a --

15 **MS. WALDER:** But, again, as of  
16 two weeks ago, you indicated Chase won't do it.  
17 Middlefield Bank and Huntington only offered  
18 conventional loans, and that --

19 **MR. FRAZIER:** Well, that was my  
20 initial discussions. And then Huntington, the  
21 Finance Officer I talked to had kicked it up.  
22 And then their Commercial -- Public Commercial  
23 Group called me and said, "Yeah, we do do that.  
24 We do lease-purchase -- government lease -- tax  
25 exempt government lease-purchases."



1           So I do have that in a spreadsheet. So that  
2 will be available. You haven't been here, so I  
3 didn't have an opportunity to sit down with you  
4 and go over that.

5           **MS. WALDER:**           Okay.

6           **MR. GABRAM:**           One question. The  
7 last -- the last pumper that we bought through  
8 Finley Fire, how different was that contract  
9 compared to the ones we are looking at today?

10          **MR. FRAZIER:**          The tanker is  
11 probably the same purchase agreement. The  
12 previous Pierce, I don't -- I don't recall. That  
13 was a long time ago. But we did a ten year -- we  
14 paid part of it, and then borrowed -- back then  
15 you could do conventional loans. Now you can't  
16 do that anymore. You have to do a tax exempt  
17 lease-purchase. That is an approved --

18          **MR. GABRAM:**          Like I said, I  
19 have gone through about four of these trucks over  
20 the years, since 1980. And I haven't run across  
21 all of these hiccups that we are encountering  
22 now. I just wonder, what different --

23          **MS. WALDER:**          Well, if you  
24 recall, the last major purchase, the Township  
25 ended up buying it outright because of problems

1 with the Lease Purchase Agreement. Everybody  
2 recall that? That --

3 **MR. FRAZIER:** Well, that was  
4 because the Prosecutor sat on it for five months,  
5 but that was way beyond our control.

6 **MS. WALDER:** Yeah. But, again,  
7 I -- I come from an engineering background. When  
8 something goes awry in a previous one, the goal  
9 is let's figure out -- you know, let's identify  
10 what went wrong and what can we do to not have a  
11 repeat of that.

12 And one of the -- you know, one of the  
13 things was, you know, let's start early and let's  
14 make sure that we have enough time to review and  
15 put the entire package together.

16 And, you know, I object to having literally  
17 a contract dropped on -- you know, on me at 2:30,  
18 and then, you know, being implied that I am  
19 somehow holding up, you know, and it going to  
20 cost the Township more.

21 The -- like I said, the -- first, I have no  
22 indication of what the price increase might be,  
23 or when it takes effect. I have heard, you know,  
24 you all say that it is expected. But, again,  
25 the -- my duty is to do that responsibly, legally

1 and in a manner that meets the ORC and Auditor of  
2 State requirements, I -- I will -- I just -- I  
3 can't -- I can't say, "Oh, no, we don't have to  
4 do that, you know, because we are going to save  
5 some money."

6 **MS. PORT:** Well, I would  
7 say that this has already been -- it is already  
8 January -- past January 4th, which is the 60  
9 days. If you said -- if you started the time  
10 period of November 4th, it is already -- January  
11 4th would be 60 days. We are already at the end  
12 of January.

13 If there is a -- I think you said there was  
14 a 14 day -- every 14 days, it kind of sweeps to a  
15 new financing thing, so that would be, what?  
16 February 1st?

17 **MR. FRAZIER:** February 7th it  
18 has to be completed by for -- for what Huntington  
19 has offered, they ask that their document be  
20 approved by the 7th. And they would hold that  
21 financing until the 28th, I believe.

22 **MR. GABRAM:** The 28th of  
23 February?

24 **MR. FRAZIER:** Yes.

25 **MR. GABRAM:** So that finance --

1                   **MS. PORT:**                   But you are saying  
2     that this, for the price -- the actual price of  
3     the bid would increase by 3 percent February  
4     1st?

5                   **MR. FRAZIER:**                 If we waited --  
6     yeah, if we waited until after February 1st for  
7     the purchase agreement with Pierce.

8                   **MS. PORT:**                   Right. Right.  
9     For the purchase agreement. So --

10                  **MR. GABRAM:**                That is a State  
11     bid? That is the 3 percent that you are talking  
12     about?

13                  **MR. FRAZIER:**                Yes. And that was  
14     already --

15                  **MR. MUELLER:**                It is \$18,000.

16                  **MR. FRAZIER:**                That was already  
17     negotiated between Pierce and Administrative  
18     Services.

19                  **MS. WALDER:**                This February 7th  
20     date to approve a finance agreement; again, I  
21     haven't even laid eyes on the finance agreement.  
22     So doing this by February 7th -- I have no idea  
23     what -- you know, what requirements would be from  
24     the Township.

25                   I know in this PNC agreement, they had a

1 whole laundry list of information, including  
2 financial documents and statements that the  
3 Fiscal Officer would have to provide in order to  
4 qualify for this financing.

5 **MR. FRAZIER:** Those have already  
6 been provided to Huntington. They do have the  
7 Master Lease Agreement; similar to what PNC had  
8 was shipped to the Prosecutor's Office for  
9 review, and then she made her tentative changes  
10 in that with Huntington. So that is the document  
11 that -- the blue markup, those are all the  
12 documents that Huntington had sent to us, and  
13 then was sent up to the Prosecutor's Office.

14 **MS. WALDER:** All right.  
15 Again, I can only say, in order to fulfill my  
16 responsibility, I need to be able to certify  
17 this. And per this ORC, it says, "Every such  
18 contract made without such a certified --  
19 certificate shall be void, and no warrant shall  
20 be issued in payment of any amounts due thereon."

21 **MS. PALMER:** Are you ready to  
22 circulate those, the Huntington markups by  
23 Krissy, or -- those weren't supposed to go  
24 anywhere, were they?

25 **MR. FRAZIER:** Well, they have --

1 there is two sets of documents. One is the  
2 lease term sheet from Huntington, so that was  
3 the document that she approved.

4 **MS. PALMER:** Right. That was  
5 supposed to get circulated, which it did.

6 **MR. FRAZIER:** Yes, that was  
7 circulated. And then we don't get -- she  
8 tentatively approved, because those are all draft  
9 documents from Huntington. Those are not -- that  
10 initiates the Master Lease. Once that is signed,  
11 those documents would come forward, then.

12 **MS. PALMER:** So do you want  
13 me to circulate -- I don't understand what I am  
14 supposed to -- should I have circulated the  
15 Huntington?

16 **MR. FRAZIER:** Well, no, because  
17 that -- they haven't issued the Master Lease  
18 yet. So that would go back to Kristen, for her  
19 review.

20 **MS. PALMER:** Okay. I just want  
21 to make sure we are --

22 **MR. FRAZIER:** Unless you want to  
23 see -- but I can get that.

24 **MS. PALMER:** Okay.

25 **MR. GABRAM:** Well, what has to

1 be done to save this 18,000 and potentially  
2 another 18,000, if the --

3 **MS. PORT:** Yeah, it sounds  
4 like it is going to be 38,000. That is pretty  
5 substantial.

6 **MR. GABRAM:** The cost  
7 fluctuates, as far as the --

8 **MR. MUELLER:** The interest is  
9 going to go up probably.

10 **MR. GABRAM:** The interest,  
11 yes.

12 **MR. MUELLER:** And, you know,  
13 if we miss the February 1st, we get hit with 3  
14 percent more.

15 **MR. GABRAM:** And we are not  
16 sure about the -- you know, the interest could  
17 stay the same, or it could go down. But the  
18 State, the 3 percent bid, is definitely -- it is  
19 definitely 18,000.

20 What can we do to save this money  
21 potentially, in addition? Is there anything we  
22 can come together with and --

23 **MS. PORT:** I would suggest  
24 that the Prosecutor Kristen -- Kristen, just make  
25 sure that if she already has that list of -- that

1 she approved for the attachment, that that goes  
2 to the Fiscal Officer for review. That if we  
3 can't agree today, that we set a special meeting  
4 for next week. And then just have everything  
5 done -- wrapped up in a week -- within a week.

6 **MR. GABRAM:** The 31st, you are  
7 right to the end.

8 **MS. PORT:** The 31st is --

9 **MR. GABRAM:** As long as it is  
10 dated --

11 **MS. PORT:** Yes, as long as it  
12 is signed.

13 **MR. MUELLER:** All right. Karen,  
14 I want you to give me a list of what it is that  
15 you want. Is one piece of paper enough?

16 **MS. WALDER:** Well, what I  
17 need --

18 **MR. MUELLER:** One of them -- one  
19 of them has to do with the lease?

20 **MS. WALDER:** An estimate of the  
21 total amount come due upon the contract that is  
22 being considered.

23 **MR. MUELLER:** Okay. We can get  
24 that for you.

25 **MR. FRAZIER:** Including



1 financing costs.

2 **MS. WALDER:** Correct.

3 **MR. FRAZIER:** Okay.

4 **MR. MUELLER:** Okay. Number 2,  
5 what? What else do you need?

6 **MS. WALDER:** I didn't see  
7 the -- I need to see the contracts.

8 **MR. MUELLER:** Contract.

9 **MS. WALDER:** I need an  
10 opportunity to review the contracts.

11 **MR. MUELLER:** The contract --

12 **MR. FRAZIER:** The contract  
13 with --

14 **MR. MUELLER:** This is Krissy's  
15 contract.

16 **MR. FRAZIER:** Huntington?

17 **MS. WALDER:** My understanding  
18 is we are going to have a purchase agreement for  
19 the pumper, and we are going to have a finance  
20 agreement.

21 Whatever agreements we are being asked to  
22 execute, I need the -- I need to see those and  
23 have the opportunity to review those.

24 **MR. MUELLER:** Purchase and what  
25 else?

1                   **MR. FRAZIER:**           Finance  
2    agreement.

3                   **MR. MUELLER:**           Finance?

4                   **MS. WALDER:**           Well, like I said,  
5    I don't know what all the agreements are at this  
6    point. I have heard two -- these two being --

7                   **MR. MUELLER:**           You said there  
8    was only two. What other one could there be? I  
9    don't know.

10                  **MS. WALDER:**           I don't know  
11    either.

12                  **MR. GABRAM:**           That should do  
13    it.

14                  **MR. MUELLER:**           All right. The  
15    third thing that you need?

16                  **MR. FRAZIER:**           Well, there is --  
17    and that was distributed. The three documents  
18    were the term agreement with Huntington. They  
19    want a resolution, as much as PNC did.

20                  **MS. PALMER:**           That was  
21    distributed.

22                  **MR. FRAZIER:**           Okay. So that is  
23    already out there.

24                  **MR. MUELLER:**           The other thing we  
25    need --

1                   **MR. FRAZIER:**           And then we are  
2                   waiting on the purchase agreement.

3                   **MR. MUELLER:**           The other thing we  
4                   need, we need to have fresh copies of all of the  
5                   Prosecutor's reviewed documents.

6                   **MR. GABRAM:**           What do you mean,  
7                   "fresh copies"?

8                   **MR. MUELLER:**           "Fresh" -- I  
9                   mean, there has been some final changes that were  
10                  made. They were made today. She hasn't had a  
11                  chance to look at them.

12                  **MR. GABRAM:**           Right.

13                  **MS. PALMER:**           Well, she hasn't  
14                  had a chance to look at them, but they are still  
15                  fresh -- very fresh.

16                  **MR. MUELLER:**           Is the ink dry? I  
17                  am sorry. All right, folks.

18                  **MS. WALDER:**           These may change  
19                  depending on Finley. We are waiting on Finley.

20                  **MR. FRAZIER:**           Yes.

21                  **MR. MUELLER:**           All right. What  
22                  else do you need?

23                  **MS. WALDER:**           I just need the  
24                  information so that I can certify it. I need to  
25                  be able to review the agreements that we are

1 being asked to --

2 **MR. FRAZIER:** Would you like  
3 a -- as far as that list of equipment, do you  
4 want something from me that says that that  
5 is -- we do not have to purchase additional  
6 equipment, or --

7 **MS. WALDER:** Well, would you  
8 provide me with the estimate of the total amount  
9 for this contract?

10 I am expecting that would include the  
11 purchase of the equipment itself, any other  
12 equipment that you might need to supply. If  
13 there is none, you know, then it is none. The  
14 cost of finance -- the finance cost, and the cost  
15 of any, you know, loan origination. I saw a  
16 reference to 250 --

17 **MR. FRAZIER:** Yeah, 250 bucks.  
18 Yes.

19 **MS. WALDER:** -- \$250. And, if  
20 possible, those costs on a yearly basis.

21 **MR. FRAZIER:** Okay.

22 **MS. WALDER:** I definitely would  
23 need to know what needs -- what would need to be  
24 encumbered in this 2020 fiscal year.

25 **MR. FRAZIER:** Okay. Yeah, that

1 would --

2 **MS. WALDER:** We definitely need  
3 that.

4 **MR. FRAZIER:** Which would be --  
5 we have that 80,000 sitting there, that can --  
6 that portion of that can be used --

7 **MS. PORT:** It says we do not  
8 have to do a deposit. "Township shall not be  
9 required to provide contract -- "

10 **MR. FRAZIER:** Right. But that  
11 80,000 that we have this year, we could encumber  
12 that for the first payment in 2021.

13 **MS. PORT:** Okay.

14 **MR. FRAZIER:** So it is -- that  
15 is budgeted money for the purpose of that  
16 pumper.

17 **MS. PORT:** Okay.

18 **MR. MUELLER:** Okay. So let's go  
19 over our list.

20 **MR. FRAZIER:** Just backing  
21 up a little bit. I don't think you had the  
22 opportunity on it.

23 When we did the 1.75-mill levy in 2016 that  
24 was voted by the people, a direct mailer went to  
25 all of the residents and specifically addressed

1 that we have an immediate and critical need to  
2 purchase a tanker and to purchase a pumper.

3 So in trying to be transparent with that,  
4 too, we were very open about our specific capital  
5 needs.

6 **MS. PORT:** Right.

7 **MR. FRAZIER:** And that -- the  
8 people voted specifically on that.

9 **MR. GABRAM:** We have got the  
10 pumper. That is in service. And the --

11 **MR. FRAZIER:** Yeah, the  
12 tanker --

13 **MR. GABRAM:** Or, rather, the  
14 tanker. And this is the second part of that.

15 **MR. FRAZIER:** Because it -- you  
16 didn't have an opportunity to know.

17 **MR. MUELLER:** Let's go down this  
18 list here. Because I would like to get specifics  
19 as to what we need here.

20 Item number 1 is a lease, total amount of  
21 agreement, okay?

22 Item 2 is the contracts, which are the  
23 purchase -- which I assume is Finley. And  
24 finance, which I assume is Huntington.

25 And the third item is all fresh documents

1 from the Prosecutor's Office as amended going  
2 forward.

3 **MS. PALMER:** Now I understand  
4 your "fresh." Thank you.

5 **MR. MUELLER:** What is that?

6 **MS. PALMER:** Super fresh. I  
7 understand what you meant by "fresh documents"  
8 after --

9 **MR. MUELLER:** Yes. Exactly.

10 **MS. PALMER:** -- after --

11 **MR. MUELLER:** Okay. Is there  
12 anything else that we need?

13 **MS. PALMER:** Exhibit 1. We  
14 still need Exhibit 1 filled in.

15 **MR. MUELLER:** What is Exhibit  
16 1?

17 **MS. PALMER:** The options list.

18 **MR. MUELLER:** Options list?

19 **MS. PALMER:** Yes.

20 **MR. MUELLER:** Okay. Number 4.

21 **MS. PORT:** But the Prosecutor  
22 said that --

23 **MR. MUELLER:** Option --

24 **MS. WALDER:** All the referenced  
25 agreements and attachments need to be -- be in

1 place.

2 **MS. PORT:** Okay.

3 **MR. MUELLER:** The options  
4 list -- let's be very specific -- covered by the  
5 ten year lease. I don't want to go after -- I  
6 want to -- I don't want to chase my tail with the  
7 options list for stuff that -- you know, three  
8 years from now that we may need to get, or  
9 something like that it. That is just -- it has  
10 got to be what is covered by the \$662,000 --

11 **MR. GABRAM:** Right. Yes.

12 **MR. MUELLER:** What I am trying  
13 to do is put a bracket around this whole thing.  
14 If you keep letting it slip out over here and  
15 slip -- you are never -- we are never going to  
16 get there.

17 All right. So having done that, when do you  
18 want to meet? Is it Monday?

19 **MR. GABRAM:** Well, the 31st is  
20 next Friday, one week from today.

21 **MR. MUELLER:** Okay. How about  
22 Monday?

23 **MS. PORT:** Monday? I can't  
24 do Monday.

25 **MR. MUELLER:** How about Sunday?



1                   **MS. WALDER:**                   What is the  
2                   purpose of this --

3                   **MR. MUELLER:**                   You cook it, and  
4                   we will have dinner at your house.

5                   **MS. PORT:**                         I know how to  
6                   cook.

7                   **MS. PALMER:**                   We need to see  
8                   when we get these documents back.

9                   **MR. FRAZIER:**                   Yeah, probably  
10                  the biggest thing is the document that will be  
11                  coming back and forth between Finley and the  
12                  Prosecutor's Office.

13                  **MS. PORT:**                         Okay.

14                  **MR. MUELLER:**                   So Tuesday --

15                  **MR. FRAZIER:**                   And I don't see  
16                  it --

17                  **MR. MUELLER:**                   Tuesday would  
18                  be --

19                  **MS. PORT:**                         Just give her a  
20                  heads up, "Hey, your husband is going to have to  
21                  make dinner for the kids and stuff. You are  
22                  going to be working."

23                  **MR. GABRAM:**                   So it will be --  
24                  we have got seven days.

25                  **MR. MUELLER:**                   And we need

1 to -- how about Tuesday, projected?

2 **MS. PORT:** Tuesday is okay.

3 If we -- well, Tuesday we should be able to --

4 **MS. PALMER:** I think we need to  
5 let Krissy coordinate the documents and find out  
6 when we can do it.

7 **MR. GABRAM:** Yeah, because we  
8 are putting a lot of weight on her.

9 **MR. MUELLER:** I hate to put this  
10 on your back, but do you want to check with our  
11 Fiscal Officer and make sure that she is  
12 satisfied with all of these things?

13 **MS. PALMER:** Sure.

14 **MR. MUELLER:** Okay.

15 **MS. WALDER:** Yeah. And,  
16 again, folks, if you are asking, you know -- I  
17 have questioned the ability to review -- or the  
18 opportunity to review these documents. Not  
19 knowing the extent of these documents or what  
20 this is, I don't know how long that will -- how  
21 long that will take.

22 **MR. MUELLER:** Well, obviously  
23 it is a big priority right now, because we are  
24 talking about \$36,000 that it could cost us --  
25 36,000 between changes of interest rate and

1 missing the deadline. That is a chunk of change  
2 on a piece of equipment that is only 660.

3 **MS. WALDER:** Oh, I don't  
4 disagree. And that is -- we have had numerous  
5 discussions and why we said, you know, please  
6 start -- you know, start early because it takes a  
7 while to go through all of this.

8 And, you know, with all due respect to the  
9 Board of Trustees, the Fire Department has had a  
10 tanker that has not been in service for over a  
11 year, sitting there, that we know that is worth  
12 at least \$13,000 on trade-in, that we have been  
13 housing and heating -- heated storage, and we  
14 have been paying insurance on. So there is  
15 13,000 that could have been saved 12 months --  
16 12 months ago.

17 **MR. MUELLER:** How much -- how  
18 much is the insurance on a \$13,000 vehicle?

19 **MR. FRAZIER:** Well, I have been  
20 trying to figure out a way to get rid of it,  
21 too. We -- I have contacted the Prosecutor over  
22 a third-party contractor. That did not meet the  
23 State statute.

24 We are looking at the GovDeals that came to  
25 our last meeting; that is probably our best bet

1 with that. We didn't have the ability to trade  
2 it in on this vehicle. We couldn't do that with  
3 the last -- the other tanker, because we had to  
4 keep it in service for a while to get people  
5 trained in driving and using the vehicle, so --  
6 so we don't -- until we do GovDeals, we don't  
7 have a viable way to get rid of that vehicle.

8 And that was presented at the last Trustees'  
9 meeting by the Police Department.

10 **MR. MUELLER:** Well, the nice  
11 thing about it is, is that the GovDeals -- I  
12 mean, I assume you could literally call them up,  
13 and in three days they have it out there?

14 **MR. FRAZIER:** Yes, once -- once  
15 we set that up --

16 **MR. MUELLER:** Yes. But I am  
17 saying, it is -- it will happen quickly.

18 **MS. PALMER:** Yes. The contract  
19 has been sent to the Prosecutor's Office.

20 **MR. MUELLER:** Okay.

21 **MS. PALMER:** So that is the  
22 first step.

23 **MS. WALDER:** My point is is  
24 that that asset has been available to get that  
25 money out for -- for at least 12 months.

1 And --

2 **MR. MUELLER:** Yeah, but up until  
3 just --

4 **MS. WALDER:** -- we have not --

5 **MR. MUELLER:** -- up until like  
6 60 days -- 30 days ago, we were under the  
7 assumption that it would be easy to use as a  
8 trade-in. And then we found out that, no, you  
9 can't quite do that.

10 **MR. FRAZIER:** Right.

11 **MR. MUELLER:** And so let's go  
12 the other direction. Time is of the ex -- of the  
13 essence. Schnell, schnell.

14 All right. I have got my list. I am going  
15 to give this to you. I want you to Xerox it and  
16 e-mail me off, and make sure John has it. If you  
17 can read my writing, we will be good, because  
18 there is four items there.

19 Pass that down, please, to Melissa.

20 **MS. PALMER:** Okay.

21 **MR. GABRAM:** Okay. We still  
22 have --

23 **MR. MUELLER:** And what we are  
24 going to -- what we are -- the plan here is that  
25 we are going to have some kind of a -- do you

1 want me to read that to you?

2 **MS. PALMER:** Luckily I made my  
3 list, too. I will work on it.

4 **MR. MUELLER:** I think you need  
5 to tell us late Monday whether we are going to  
6 be meeting on Tuesday in the a.m. sometime.  
7 So --

8 **MS. PALMER:** Well, don't  
9 forget that I need 24 hours to Sunshine it, too.  
10 I mean, this is --

11 **MR. MUELLER:** Yeah, I  
12 understand.

13 **MS. PALMER:** We will work on  
14 a turnaround time as soon as possible, but --

15 **MR. MUELLER:** Okay.

16 **MR. GABRAM:** I guess at this  
17 point, we still have got an open motion on the  
18 first one. You should call a question on it.  
19 What was --

20 **MR. MUELLER:** Yes. Do you want  
21 to vote on that? That is fine.

22 I was under the impression that you didn't  
23 want to vote on any of these until we got those  
24 four items.

25 **MR. GABRAM:** Well, we --

1                   **MS. PORT:**                   Well, essentially  
2     it is still going back to the Prosecutor,  
3     correct?

4                   **MR. MUELLER:**                   That is correct.  
5     I mean, I am comfortable with that motion.

6                   **MR. GABRAM:**                   She has the final  
7     say-so. If she says no, this -- then we can't do  
8     it.

9                   **MR. MUELLER:**                   No, now wait a  
10    minute.

11                  **MR. GABRAM:**                   Pending approval.

12                  **MR. MUELLER:**                   Don't -- don't --  
13    there has got to be a way it can be done. Don't  
14    tell me, "Oh, well, gee, we can't do this."  
15    Every -- every political subdivision in Ohio has  
16    probably done one of these at some point in  
17    time. I don't see why we can't do one now.

18                  **MR. GABRAM:**                   Well, as this  
19    reads there, it says "pending approval by the  
20    Geauga County Prosecutor."

21                  **MR. MUELLER:**                   There you go. And  
22    the other thing I like is if we -- if we do the  
23    contract, the pumper contract, does that lock us  
24    in and we don't have to worry about that 33  
25    percent -- the 3 percent increase? I think it

1 probably does.

2                   **MR. FRAZIER:**           Well, you would  
3 have to sign that purchase agreement.

4                   **MS. PALMER:**           And have it  
5 certified.

6                   **MR. GABRAM:**           And have it  
7 certified. But if it is not approved, we can't  
8 go ahead and buy that. It has to be approved.

9                   That is the way I am looking at it. I mean,  
10 if she comes back -- or this motion has to be  
11 changed.

12                   **MR. MUELLER:**           Well, I guess my  
13 point is, is that she can do what she has to do  
14 to make it good. That -- in the end, we are  
15 going to buy this damn pumper. And we are going  
16 to buy it on a lease-purchase basis.

17                   I don't know what the weasel words are that  
18 you have to put on the contract. But the bottom  
19 line is, it can be done and it will be done.

20                   **MR. GABRAM:**           Well, it still --  
21 well, it --

22                   **MR. MUELLER:**           Do you want to  
23 table this and do all three of these when we come  
24 back on --

25                   **MR. GABRAM:**           Yeah, that is --



1                   **MS. PORT:**                   Well, I think that  
2 we can still do that you would be the contract --

3                   **MR. MUELLER:**                   Where is that? Is  
4 that number 2?

5                   **MS. PORT:**                   This purchase  
6 agreement, yes. I mean, that is --

7                   **MR. MUELLER:**                   All right. Can I  
8 have a motion?

9                   **MS. PALMER:**                   I wouldn't, not  
10 until you have a purchase agreement. I would  
11 not.

12                   **MR. GABRAM:**                   Yeah. That is  
13 just -- that is putting the horse before the  
14 cart.

15                   **MS. PALMER:**                   The cart before --  
16 yes. Thank you. I would not do that.

17                   **MR. GABRAM:**                   Yeah, we  
18 probably -- but we still have an open motion  
19 here, a second, and we still have --

20                   **MR. MUELLER:**                   All right. Does  
21 somebody want to move to table the motion?

22                   **MR. GABRAM:**                   Well, wait a  
23 minute. We could table it.

24                   **MS. PORT:**                   Well, we could --  
25 if we have a motion, we could just all say no,

1 and then it would die.

2 **MR. GABRAM:** Right. It would  
3 die on the floor.

4 **MS. PORT:** Right.

5 **MR. GABRAM:** Or, you know, you  
6 vote yes for it, and approve -- approval as to  
7 the form of it.

8 **MS. PORT:** Right.

9 **MR. GABRAM:** I mean, the  
10 form is -- if the form is no good, this motion is  
11 no good.

12 **MR. MUELLER:** Yeah.

13 **MR. GABRAM:** That is the way I  
14 read it.

15 **MR. MUELLER:** But the idea that  
16 it is not going to happen is not on the table.  
17 It is not on the table.

18 **MR. GABRAM:** It's -- this will  
19 happen. The problem is we have got -- time.

20 **MS. PORT:** Okay. This --  
21 this number is not going to change at all? This  
22 800721?

23 **MR. MUELLER:** Yeah. That is --

24 **MR. FRAZIER:** Yeah, that is what  
25 this actually refers to.

1                   **MS. PORT:**                   That is going to  
2 stay the same?

3                   **MR. FRAZIER:**                   Yep.

4                   **MS. PORT:**                   So it really is --  
5 nothing that precludes us from saying okay to --

6                   **MS. PALMER:**                   The date of  
7 today's meeting -- the purchase agreement, it  
8 might change, today's meeting.

9                   **MS. PORT:**                   Well, we can  
10 just -- we could just --

11                   **MS. PALMER:**                   That is the only  
12 specific --

13                   **MS. PORT:**                   Yes.

14                   **MR. MUELLER:**                   Okay. Do you want  
15 to go ahead and vote on the first motion that is  
16 on the floor?

17                   **MR. GABRAM:**                   Well, you either  
18 vote yes or no. I mean, we vote yes -- pending  
19 the approval of the -- you know, that is the  
20 whole thing, pending the approval of the -- of  
21 the Geauga County Prosecutor. If she says -- if  
22 she doesn't approve it, this is no good.

23                   **MR. MUELLER:**                   Which, in my  
24 opinion, my view at this point, I hate to put the  
25 heat on her, but, you know, she has got to find a

1 methodology and the --

2 **MR. GABRAM:** And if she doesn't  
3 find -- if she cannot make it work, then this  
4 motion is no good. If she can make it work, then  
5 the motion is already made.

6 **MS. PORT:** Well, then, there  
7 is no harm, no foul. I mean, we made a motion.  
8 If she didn't follow through --

9 **MR. GABRAM:** That is the way I  
10 read it.

11 **MS. PORT:** -- then the onus  
12 is on her.

13 **MR. GABRAM:** Right.

14 **MS. PORT:** It is not  
15 something -- it is something we say as a group we  
16 want. If it doesn't come to fruition, then there  
17 is nothing against us to say --

18 **MR. GABRAM:** Yes. I think --

19 **MR. MUELLER:** Howard -- Howard,  
20 you are an attorney.

21 **MR. GABRAM:** If the Board wants  
22 it --

23 **MR. MUELLER:** It is a damn poor  
24 attorney that can't make something happen.

25 **MR. SHANKER:** Can I send you a

1 bill?

2 What you need -- what you need to do is you  
3 have to have a billed sheet to say what -- how  
4 the thing has to be billed.

5 And then I have a question, or two.

6 Well, that is what she needs.

7 **MR. MUELLER:** Howard, you are  
8 allowed to have a question. You have sat through  
9 this.

10 **MR. SHANKER:** Okay. I wanted to  
11 know what kind of engine is in the pumper. And  
12 does it have Halon capabilities since we are  
13 adding another gas station here?

14 **MR. FRAZIER:** The -- it is a  
15 Cummins --

16 **MR. MUELLER:** It is a diesel,  
17 isn't it?

18 **MR. SHANKER:** Yeah, Cummins is  
19 the best value, correct. Because they built them  
20 as far as -- with Stewart & Stevenson's, which  
21 are like three times more.

22 And Halon is to put out, like, fuel fires.

23 **MR. FRAZIER:** Yeah. Well,  
24 actually, we use foam for that. And --

25 **MR. SHANKER:** But isn't the

1 Halon -- it is foam. Is it coming with foam?

2 **MR. FRAZIER:** We have a separate  
3 vehicle for that right now.

4 **MR. SHANKER:** Okay.

5 **MR. FRAZIER:** It's -- our  
6 current Pierce has a foam system in it.

7 **MR. SHANKER:** Yeah, I know.

8 **MR. FRAZIER:** This vehicle would  
9 not have one in it.

10 **MR. SHANKER:** And are you guys  
11 selling the current one that we have, or --

12 **MR. FRAZIER:** We would get rid  
13 of the 1988. And we would get rid of the -- the  
14 tanker really doesn't bear on that. That is a  
15 separate issue.

16 **MR. SHANKER:** As long as you  
17 will still have it; I think you will need it for  
18 the second gas station.

19 **MR. FRAZIER:** Well --

20 **MR. SHANKER:** I mean, I hope you  
21 don't need it, but --

22 **MR. FRAZIER:** The ultimate  
23 vehicle it will replace is a 1988 Pierce. But  
24 the vehicles from this area are not highly  
25 sought, because of the --

1                   **MR. SHANKER:**           The rust. The  
2 rust.

3                   **MR. FRAZIER:**           Yes. Especially a  
4 32 year old --

5                   **MR. SHANKER:**           Well, did you guys  
6 think of just having an auction with that guy who  
7 sells everything? KIKO?

8                   **MR. FRAZIER:**           We've had very  
9 poor luck with that.

10                  **MR. SHANKER:**           Well, I will tell  
11 you, there is a big auction for tractors, maybe  
12 in about two months with -- I don't know his  
13 name. Maybe it is KIKO.

14                  **MR. MUELLER:**           Well, we are going  
15 to put you in charge of this.

16                  **MR. SHANKER:**           Middlefield  
17 Auction. He has their spring auction, at the  
18 fairgrounds. And they get over -- they get over  
19 500 or 600 vehicles. So you can --

20                  **MR. MUELLER:**           But you have got  
21 to have somebody who wants to buy a fire truck.

22                  **MR. SHANKER:**           Well, that is the  
23 auctioneer. I mean, if you want to get rid of  
24 it, get rid of it. I mean, maybe someone --

25                  **MR. MUELLER:**           But we have

1 this other thing. You didn't sit through that  
2 Gov --

3 **MR. SHANKER:** I did. I thought  
4 you guys were selling it -- trading it in the  
5 last time I was here. But I guess --

6 **MR. MUELLER:** Well, that is --  
7 that is the vehicle, I think, we are going to  
8 use, to get rid of.

9 **MR. GABRAM:** We could not trade  
10 it in as --

11 **MR. SHANKER:** You can definitely  
12 sell it there. The guy sells -- I mean, he sells  
13 everything from 100,000 and down. They sell a  
14 lot of tractors.

15 **MR. MUELLER:** All right. Ladies  
16 and gentlemen, where are we on this?

17 **MS. WALDER:** I have one other  
18 question. Is anyone beside me uncomfortable with  
19 the idea of voting on a purchase agreement that  
20 no elected official of the Township has read?

21 **MS. PORT:** I did look at this  
22 document. I printed it off. I did review it. I  
23 looked at Melissa's notes.

24 **MS. WALDER:** Thank you.

25 **MS. PORT:** I did go -- I did



1 call the Prosecutor's Office today.

2 **MR. MUELLER:** This man right  
3 here --

4 **MS. PORT:** I took the  
5 initiative to --

6 **MR. MUELLER:** This man right  
7 here has done dozens of these things.

8 **MS. PORT:** -- to say, "Hey,  
9 what are the two -- what are the small things  
10 that you need?" And the response was -- was with  
11 the financing, and the other was just the  
12 itemization. And I asked John about itemization,  
13 and he said, "Yes. The Prosecutor is aware of  
14 that, the items list, so that everything is  
15 specified. It is going to be attached to -- as  
16 another attachment to this agreement."

17 And so those were -- those were things that  
18 I had done and read through --

19 **MS. WALDER:** Okay.

20 **MS. PORT:** -- prior.

21 **MS. WALDER:** I am just saying,  
22 I am extremely uncomfortable with this.

23 **MS. PORT:** I --

24 **MR. MUELLER:** I will be honest  
25 with you. Even if you read it, I am not sure you

1 would catch some of the really significant small  
2 things that are in there, but he would. He has  
3 done it dozens of times, and I trust him.

4 **MR. GABRAM:** And also the  
5 Prosecutor goes through, the rights and wrongs,  
6 which I have no idea. I am not a lawyer.

7 **MR. SHANKER:** Well, you were a  
8 fireman, though, weren't you?

9 **MR. GABRAM:** Yeah. Well, I am  
10 fine with what is going on here. But as far as  
11 the -- you know, the paperwork makes it a legal  
12 contract and not a legal contract, that is the  
13 reason we have -- and a person up there at the  
14 County, assigned to the Township, to make those  
15 decisions. If it is a good contract, sign off on  
16 it.

17 **MR. SHANKER:** Well, they are  
18 good -- they are great fire engines.

19 **MR. GABRAM:** It is.

20 **MR. MUELLER:** Okay. I am at  
21 your disposal, ladies and gentlemen.

22 **MR. GABRAM:** Pardon?

23 **MR. MUELLER:** I said I am at  
24 your disposal. What do you want to do here?

25 **MR. GABRAM:** Well, the way I

1 read it here, it is pending -- it all depends on  
2 whether the Prosecuting Attorney is going to  
3 approve the form -- the contract, the way it is  
4 put together.

5 **MR. MUELLER:** I am comfortable  
6 with that.

7 **MS. PORT:** Well, essentially  
8 we are the ones agreeing on the terms. She is --  
9 she -- hers is the format that --

10 **MR. MUELLER:** Right.

11 **MS. PORT:** -- legally is in  
12 the best interest of Russell Township.

13 **MR. GABRAM:** And if she figures  
14 it is not, then this whole motion doesn't really  
15 do any good, because we have got to then put  
16 together a contract that is correct.

17 **MR. MUELLER:** But that is her  
18 job.

19 **MR. GABRAM:** Right. Not ours.

20 **MR. MUELLER:** Not our job. That  
21 is right.

22 **MR. GABRAM:** So we are waiting  
23 for that. So, I mean, it wouldn't make any  
24 difference to vote yes or no on it, I mean,  
25 because --

1                   **MR. MUELLER:**            Could I have a  
2 motion to table this until our next meeting?

3                   **MR. GABRAM:**            I so move that.

4                   **MS. PORT:**                What about this  
5 resolution? I am sorry. I mean, is that  
6 something that has to get redone?

7                   **MS. PALMER:**            A resolution?

8                   **MS. PORT:**                Is that dated for  
9 anything? A resolution for --

10                  **MS. PALMER:**            I am sorry. Let  
11 me look to refresh my memory.

12                  **MS. PORT:**                Because it was --  
13 it says, "Whereby" -- blah, blah, blah, blah,  
14 blah.

15                  **MS. PALMER:**            This is a  
16 Huntington resolution to do financing. Right,  
17 John?

18                  **MR. FRAZIER:**            Yes.

19                  **MS. PORT:**                So would that  
20 help, or do you need, Karen, to have specifics  
21 from Huntington before we do a resolution?

22                  **MS. WALDER:**            Yeah. I don't  
23 know how that plays in with the rest of the  
24 Huntington documents.

25                  **MS. PORT:**                Okay. So that

1 is -- that is something we can --

2 **MR. GABRAM:** Krissy has to look  
3 at the --

4 **MR. FRAZIER:** She did.

5 **MR. GABRAM:** She did. That is  
6 all right, that part of the --

7 **MS. PALMER:** Yeah, Krissy is  
8 good with this, but I don't think there is a  
9 point in doing this without a purchase  
10 agreement.

11 **MR. MUELLER:** Correct. That is  
12 kind of what I figured.

13 **MS. PALMER:** Then I can  
14 revise --

15 **MS. PORT:** Okay. And then,  
16 Karen, that is already the -- the Assistant  
17 Prosecutor has already looked at that list for  
18 that.

19 **MS. WALDER:** Okay.

20 **MS. PORT:** Okay.

21 **MR. MUELLER:** I am going to call  
22 the question. All of those in favor of tabling  
23 it will say --

24 **MS. WALDER:** Well, hang on. We  
25 don't have a second for the motion to table it.

1                   **MR. GABRAM:**           I will second it.  
2                   **MR. MUELLER:**           I will second it.  
3                   **MR. GABRAM:**           You make the  
4 motion. I will second it.  
5                   **MR. MUELLER:**           No. You make the  
6 motion. I will second it.  
7                   **MR. GABRAM:**           I will make the  
8 motion that we table it. You can second it.  
9                   **MS. PORT:**                Okay.  
10                  **MR. GABRAM:**            Call the question.  
11                  **MS. WALDER:**            I will call for  
12 roll. Ms. Port?  
13                  **MS. PORT:**                Yes.  
14                  **MS. WALDER:**            It's the motion to  
15 table it?  
16                  **MR. GABRAM:**            Yes.  
17                  **MR. MUELLER:**            Yes.  
18                  **MS. WALDER:**            Mr. Gabram?  
19                  **MR. GABRAM:**            Yes.  
20                  **MS. WALDER:**            Mr. Mueller?  
21                  **MR. MUELLER:**            Yes.  
22                  **MR. GABRAM:**            Okay.  
23                  **MS. PORT:**                Can I make a  
24 motion that we have -- hear back from the  
25 Assistant Prosecutor at -- regarding this

1 purchase agreement and form so that  
2 within --

3 **MR. GABRAM:** Within seven  
4 days.

5 **MR. MUELLER:** No, we can't do  
6 seven days.

7 **MS. PALMER:** I don't think we  
8 need to make a motion to --

9 **MR. MUELLER:** No. No. That is  
10 why I think Melissa needs to follow up on it and  
11 make sure that --

12 **MS. PORT:** Because I just  
13 wanted to have it so that if somebody looked at  
14 our minutes and said, "Okay. This is tabled,"  
15 but then we do another Sunshine for another  
16 special meeting -- it doesn't make any  
17 difference. Okay. All right.

18 **MS. PALMER:** We can indicate  
19 that we are going to have another special  
20 meeting.

21 **MS. PORT:** Okay. All right.  
22 So what do you need from us? Anything that we  
23 can do?

24 **MR. FRAZIER:** Well, actually,  
25 Melissa has the draft, the Huntington documents,

1 so that can go to the Fiscal Officer.

2 MS. PALMER: The blue marked up  
3 ones?

4 MR. FRAZIER: Yes.

5 MS. PALMER: Do you want her to  
6 have those now?

7 MR. MUELLER: Yes.

8 MR. FRAZIER: Yes.

9 MS. PALMER: Okay.

10 MR. FRAZIER: So that would be  
11 all the Huntington documents that --

12 MS. PALMER: Okay. All right.

13 MR. FRAZIER: -- that Kristen  
14 has. Plus you distributed already the term sheet  
15 with Huntington?

16 MS. PORT: Which is what we  
17 had in our resolution?

18 MR. FRAZIER: Yes.

19 MS. PORT: Okay.

20 MS. PALMER: I distributed only  
21 the two documents that you said I could. The two  
22 that Krissy --

23 MR. MUELLER: Approved.

24 MS. PALMER: -- stamped.

25 MR. FRAZIER: Yeah. One of



1 those was the term sheet, and then the other was  
2 the purchase agreement. So she -- she redacted  
3 the purchase agreement. And you have the -- you  
4 already distributed the Huntington term sheet.  
5 So the Fiscal Officer would need the draft, the  
6 lease agreement from Huntington; everything that  
7 Kristen had reviewed.

8 **MS. PALMER:** Okay.

9 **MS. PORT:** And then you will  
10 get back to them for your -- when you hear back  
11 from Finley?

12 **MR. FRAZIER:** Yes. As soon as I  
13 walk out, I will call them and see if they  
14 received -- make sure they received that.

15 **MS. PORT:** And then they will  
16 get those documents for review. That sounds  
17 right.

18 **MR. GABRAM:** Yes.

19 **MR. MUELLER:** So we are going to  
20 have some kind of a planner recall from our able  
21 assistant Igor --

22 **MS. PALMER:** Thank you.

23 **MR. MUELLER:** -- who will tell  
24 us where we are relative to the document review  
25 from her, and the four items that I put on that

1 list.

2 Okay. Can we have a motion to adjourn?

3 I am only the Chairman. Nobody listens to  
4 me.

5 **MR. FRAZIER:** I think they are  
6 engaged.

7 **MR. MUELLER:** Hey you, can we  
8 have a motion to adjourn?

9 **MS. PORT:** I -- I make a  
10 motion to adjourn.

11 **MR. MUELLER:** Second.

12 **MR. GABRAM:** Second.

13 **MR. MUELLER:** All of those in  
14 favor?

15 **MS. PORT:** Aye.

16 **MR. GABRAM:** Aye.

17 **MR. MUELLER:** Aye. Good. Thank  
18 you. Have a nice day, folks.

19 (Thereupon, the meeting was  
20 adjourned at 5:50 p.m.)
